

Private Residential Swimming Pools and Temporary above Ground Swimming Pools

Definitions:

Swimming Pool: Any indoor or outdoor structure intended for swimming or wading. The structure may be constructed, installed or located in-ground, partially in-ground or above ground and may include permanent or temporary swimming pools.

Fence: Any partition, structure, wall or gate erected as a dividing mark, barrier or enclosure.

Private residential pool: A pool connected with a single family residence or owner occupied duplex, located on private property under the control of the property owner the use of which is limited to family members or the family's invited guests. A private residential pool is not part of a business.

Temporary pool: A pool which is installed for a period of not more than 180 days and removed from the site.

Location Requirements for Any Pool Style:

Swimming pools and any attached or functionally related deck or patio shall comply with the required yard setbacks for the relevant zoning district. No pool shall be located within a drainage or utility easement. Swimming pools must be located in the rear yard.

Setback requirements for a pool with a surrounding deck or patio are typically 10 feet from the side property lines, 15 feet from the street side property line and 20 feet from the rear yard property line. Temporary swimming pools may be as close as 10 feet to the rear property line.

Accessory structures and uses including pools, pool houses, patios, sheds, etc. cannot occupy more than 25% of your rear yard.

The filter pumping unit and heaters on any swimming pool shall comply with the required yard setbacks.

Private Residential Permanent Pools

A building permit is required for all private permanent above or in-ground residential swimming pools that exceed either of these two requirements:

- Depth of more than two feet (24") at any point.
- Volume over 5,000 gallons

General Pool Regulations:

Any work involving modifications to an electrical system, adding circuits or equipment that requires electrical work will require an electrical permit. The filling of any pool from a fire hydrant is strictly prohibited.

Pool Application Requirements:

Each application for a permit to construct or erect a permanent swimming pool shall be accompanied by plans of sufficient detail to show:

- A site plan drawing of the property with the proposed location of the pool, patio and/or decking, fence and its relationship to the house on the lot and distances to the property lines. In addition show the existing structures on the lot, including sheds, patios, etc.
- The size and depth of the pool.
- The location, size and types of equipment to be used in connection with the pool, including, but not limited to heater, filter unit, pump, fencing and the pool itself.

Fence Requirements:

All pools for which a permit is required and granted shall be provided with safeguards to prevent children from gaining uncontrolled access. A fence that is six feet (6') in height shall be constructed and maintained enclosing a pool that meets the following criteria:

- Fencing shall effectively prevent the entrance of children and be without hand or footholds that would enable a child to climb over it.
- All fencing opening or points of entry into the pool enclosure shall be equipped with gates or doors.
- All gates or doors to swimming pools shall be equipped with self-closing and self-latching devices, which are capable of being locked and placed at a sufficient height so as to be inaccessible to children.
- Prior to filling of the pool, an approved fence must be completely in place, inspected and approved by the city building official or his or her agent.
- The sides of above ground pools may function as the fence provided the entrance of the pool is designed to restrict access by children.
- A zoning permit will be required for the fence.
